ITEMS FROM THE PUBLIC

Chair Reagan invited members of the public to address the Board on matters not listed on the agenda, but within the subject matter jurisdiction of the Board. The following

comments were received:

A. Donald Tipton, unincorporated Vallejo, noted that he felt that his experience with the County's procedures for voting and paying taxes was efficient. Mr. Tipton noted that he felt that the Board of Supervisors Meeting Attendance Reports were inadequate and felt that the information in those reports should be expanded.

B. George Guynn, Jr., Suisun, expressed concern regarding the purchase of a building needing seismic upgrades in San Francisco by the Metropolitan Transportation Commission for \$93 million.

Supervisor Kondylis noted that she felt that the building purchased was too far from major public transportation cores, would add to congestion, and would limit public participation.

C. June Guidotti, unincorporated Suisun, expressed concern regarding a proposed 22 acre composting facility being installed by Potrero Hills Landfill without environmental review. Ms. Guidotti expressed concern regarding purported conflict of interests.

D. Laura Peters, Vacaville, expressed concern that the City of Vacaville will be asking Solano County to remove 1000 acres of land from agricultural preserve in order to build homes east of Leisure Town Road.

The Board noted that the Local Agency Formation Commission would be reviewing and considering this matter.

Bob Lawton, County Administrators Office, provided the Board with an overview of the Public Safety Realignment Plan which was a major restructuring of finance and responsibility in the State of California for the criminal justice system and the manner in which supervision and incarceration is provided for low level offenders and those who have been released from State prison after serving their full sentence. Mr. Lawton noted that in 2011, the U.S. Supreme Court case *Brown v. Plata* rendered a decision that required the State of California to reduce its prison population by approximately 35,000 inmates within the next two years. Mr. Lawton noted that at the same time, the State of California faced a budget crisis of unprecedented proportions with a \$20 billion budget deficit and the annual cost of state incarceration averaging \$47,000 per inmate with the cost of parole approximately \$6,400 per inmate- nearly double the amount seven years earlier. Mr. Lawton noted that the state determined that it would reduce the supply of inmates by reclassifying offenses as requiring local rather than state custody and redirecting the supervision of released inmates to local probation agencies rather than state parole offices and agents. Mr. Lawton noted that the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation estimated an additional 488 cases to Solano County under Realignment in FY2011/12. Mr. Lawton noted that in 2009, state law established Community Corrections Partnerships, setting forth requirements for their membership and designated the Chief Probation Officer as the Chair. Mr. Lawton indicated that responsibilities were expanded under AB 109, requiring the Community Corrections Partnership to recommend a Local Plan to the County Board of Supervisors for implementation of the 2011 Public Safety Realignment Plan. Mr. Lawton reported that Solano County's Public Safety Realignment revenues would total \$4.3 million for FY2011/12, of which \$236,000 was previously appropriated for the creation of 3.0 FTE Deputy Probation Officers during the remainder of FY2011/12 with the remaining \$4,126,574 being requested to be appropriated as follows: 1) \$3,571,412 for Realignment Programs; 2) \$268,675 for non-recurring Realignment start-up costs; 3) \$136,487 to be divided equally between the District Attorney and Public Defender for costs arising out of revocation hearings; and 4) \$150,000 for Community Corrections Partnership's Realignment planning activities.

Isabelle Voit, Chief Probation Officer, provided an overview of the State legislation implementing the 2011 Public Safety Realignment Plan which had the intent to reduce prison crowding, save the state money, and reduce recidivism. It was noted that the primary mechanism to accomplish this was by expanding local responsibility for specified felony offenders by using known proven principals (evidence based practices - built into the plan). Ms. Voit reviewed the key elements of the 2011 Public Safety Realignment and noted that Public Safety Realignment did not release inmates from state prison early or transfer state prison inmates to local jails. Ms. Voit reviewed the funding of the 2011 Public Safety Realignment, past actions taken by the Board in the development of the Plan, and actions taken toward implementation of the Plan. Ms. Voit highlighted the major components of the Plan which included: 1) Risk and Needs Assessment; 2) Community Supervision; 3) Alternatives to Custody; 4) Intermediate Sanctions; 5) Custody and In-Custody Programs; 6) Reentry; and 7) Service Delivery Strategies.

Tom Ferrara, Sheriffs Office, noted that one major component of the Plan was training and that there would be ongoing staff training addressing the big picture as well as operational detail; participation in external training provided by various entities, and training to stakeholders and staff on realignment, evidence based practices and other topics.

Patrick Duterte, Director of Health and Social Services, reviewed their communications plan to keep partners and stakeholders engaged and informed; share legal and

implementation updates; specific agency communication; and public education forums.

Ms. Voit noted that they had built in an evaluation and ongoing quality control to track statistics, measure progress, and track outcomes. Ms. Voit noted that funding requests before the Board were approved by the Community Corrections Partnership by a 6-1 vote of the Executive Committee and addressed incarceration, supervision, and treatment/intervention needs. It was noted that treatment/intervention represented 24% of the available first year funding allocation; Probation services (including Reentry Coordinator position) represented 26% of the recommended first year funding allocation; Sheriffs Office (including incarceration, ATC, recovery team, and law enforcement task force) represented 40% of the recommended first year funding allocation.

Don du Bain, District Attorney, noted that he was not supportive of the Implementation Plan and the recommended funding allocation. Mr. du Bain noted that he was supportive of phasing of the allocation resources as determined by the needs which were unknown at this time. Mr. du Bain noted that there was wide consensus that there was not enough funding from the state to provide for incarceration of felons as well as treatment and services. Mr. du Bain noted that he was supportive of only funding eminent public safety and medical needs and of deferring the remainder of the funding until there was a concrete proposal from the Realignment Committee on how to spend that funding.

Chief Word, Vallejo Police Department, noted that he supported a balanced approach of enforcement, suppression, and prevention and felt that programs would need to be in place at the local level to address mental health, substance abuse, housing, and education programs. Chief Word expressed his concern that the unemployment rate was high and that there was a high risk of re-offending without jobs.

Donald Tipton, unincorporated Vallejo, expressed his concern regarding the unemployment rate and protection of the public.

Bob Stalker, Chair of Solano Re-entry Council, expressed the need for mental health, substance abuse treatment, medical, and housing for those populations returning to the community from state prisons.

Lloyd Gieg, Genesis House, Community Corrections Partnership, and Re-entry Council, noted that he felt there should be funding available to those organizations that were providing direct services as state funding had been eliminated for community programs and costs had increased.

Renee Smith, Vallejo, expressed support for treatment services in order to reduce recidivism as causes of criminal behavior in women were poverty, trauma, and addiction.

Chair Reagan noted that the state law was poorly written and was an underfunded mandate to the counties. Chair Reagan noted that one-third of the states expenditure was insufficient and that the Governor's proposal to provide 80% of the state's cost to the counties was more appropriate. Chair Reagan encouraged staff to track unfunded costs to generate debate with the state and to prepare for future litigation.

At the conclusion of discussion, the Board took the following action:

that the County of Solano 2011 Public Safety Realignment Act Implementation Plan as approved and recommended to the Board of Supervisors by the Executive Committee of the Solano Community Corrections Partnership be approved.

A motion was made by Supervisor Spring, seconded by Supervisor Seifert, that the Public Safety Realignment Committee be directed to meet on a monthly basis and report back to the Board of Supervisors on the first meeting in January, 2012.

A motion was made by Supervisor Spring, seconded by Supervisor Vasquez, approving an Appropriation Transfer Request recognizing \$2,989,174 in new revenue under the 2011 Criminal Justice Realignment Act through June 30, 2012 for Sheriff Corrections Non-Staff (applied to reduce General Fund Contribution for food, clothing and other items for 80 new Realignment inmates); Task Force (Local Police Overtime); Probation; Public Defender; District Attorney; and Community Corrections Partnership.

A motion was made by Supervisor Spring, seconded by Supervisor Seifert, to approve the commitment of \$1,137,400 in appropriations for the purpose of a day reporting center, substance abuse, mental health, Workforce Investment Board, and community impact/contingency.

The Board received a presentation on Mental Health programs and services and was requested to consider approving an Appropriation Transfer Request in the amount of \$2,773,583 to distribute the State budget reductions in funding for AB3632 among Mental Health Divisions Salaries, Benefits and Contract Services.

Halsey Simmons, Mental Health Director, noted that while there continued to be a greater demand for mental health services, staffing was significantly reduced, and funding from the Countys General Fund was declining. Mr. Simmons noted that the receipt of the Intergovernmental Transfer Funding would be used to offset current expenses associated with the Behavioral Health Federally Qualified Centers (FQHC) during their transition periods as well as fund projects identified in the community that will improve access to behavioral health services. Mr. Simmons noted that the state suspended the AB3632 mandate for FY2010/11 and the responsibility for providing AB3632 services for FY2010/11 lay with the Special Education Local Planning Areas in each County. Therefore a sizeable amount of funds that would formerly have been recuperated will no longer be available, and a significant number of students will no longer be served by Solano County Mental Health. Mr. Simmons reviewed issues that were arising in serving the mentally ill and how those issues were being resolved.

Doug Hayward, Solano Coalition for Better Health, reviewed the activities of the Solano Coalition for Better Health Mental Health Task Force which was established to address the delivery of services and issues impacting the community.

The Board received a presentation from Health and Social Services Department regarding the current status of Child Welfare Services and was requested to consider adopting a resolution to amend the Position Allocation List to add 7.0 FTE Social Worker III positions, Limited Term, and 1.0 FTE Social Services Supervisor position Limited Term, effective January 8, 2012 for a period of 1 year and approving an Appropriation Transfer Request to transfer \$155,869 in County General Fund from the Assistance Division to the Social Services Division and recognize \$289,472 in unanticipated Federal/State revenue to cover the FY2011/12 cost of \$445,341.

Director of Health and Social Services Patrick Duterte noted that as a result of the recession, their costs continued to increase while their revenues decreased. Mr. Duterte noted that efforts designed to keep children out of foster care would lower their General Fund costs.

Linda Orrante, Deputy Director of Children and Adult Services, reviewed the operations of the Child Welfare Services and their effortstoward cost avoidance by providing early intervention for children and families. Ms. Orrante noted that there were rate increases for childrenplaced in foster care, increases in emergency response referrals and reductions in Child Welfare Services staffing. Ms. Orrante noted that a well-implemented in-home services program could reduce future foster care costs and that their goal would be to strengthen families so that children can live safely and prevent abuse from recurring. At the conclusion of discussion, the Board took the following action:

The Board received a presentation on County Assistance programs and potential impacts of State and Federal reductions.

Director of Health and Social Services Patrick Duterte noted that the County was mandated through both State and Federal statutes to provide eligible individuals and families with public assistance through several different programs: CalFresh, formally known as Food Stamps, General Assistance, CalWORKS, Foster Care, Adoption Assistance, and through the In-Home Supportive Services program.

Christiana Smith, Deputy Director of Employment and Eligibility, provided an overview of the various assistance programs, their mandates, and their sources of funding. Ms. Smith provided an overview of funding changes in FY2011/12 due to 2011 Realignment which transferred fiscal responsibility for the State share of adoptions, CalWORKs and Foster Care. It was noted that the 2011 Realignment was not intended to have any net impact on the County General Fund due to other changes in realignment but those impacts were yet to be determined. Ms. Smith noted that residential placement for Seriously Emotionally Disturbed children had been transferred to the schools and that American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) funding had been discontinued which would impact the County's share of costs for In-Home Supportive Services. Ms. Smith noted that caseload increases and staff reductions have had a negative impact on their ability to process benefits timely, meet work participation rates standards, and achieve the required accuracy rates. Ms. Smith noted that there was a risk of fiscal and/or legal sanctions if there was an inability to correct these issues and that clients were being impacted by delays in receiving assistance. Ms. Smith noted that the County had the limited ability to control costs due to caseload fluctuations and state and federal regulations; the County's share of cost was mandated and the 2011 Realignment increased the County's fiscal responsibility. Ms. Smith noted that their efforts to manage costs included the implementation of self service options, business process redesign to streamline work, fraud prevention initiative for In-Home Supportive Services, and Foster Care cost avoidance proposals.
